
The Parallel Lives of Joshua Chamberlain (USA) and John Gordon (CSA): Commanders at the Battle of Gettysburg

John Gordon was born in Upson County, Georgia, on February 6, 1832. His father was a farmer, and his mother was a devout Methodist. Chamberlain resumed his law practice and became involved in politics. He served as governor of Maine from 1867 to 1871 and was elected to the United States Senate in 1876.




