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Materials You'll Need

Getting Started

- **Slip stitch.** This stitch is used to join pieces of crochet together or to create a decorative border. To slip stitch, insert the hook into the next stitch and yarn over. Then, pull the yarn through the stitch and slide the stitch off the hook.

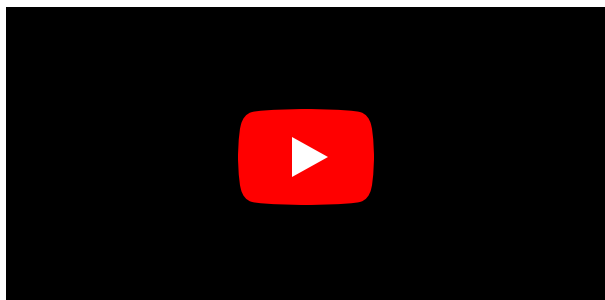
Troubleshooting
